

Art III



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Course Description: This advanced course further develops skills in painting and drawing, including realistic and abstract forms of representational subject matter using both traditional and contemporary styles. The student studies both two-dimensional and three-dimensional techniques, and compositional development into their projects. Students are required to keep a portfolio and a sketchbook including sketches and class handouts.

Instructional Philosophy: Art courses at NPA are considered hands-on studio courses. Lecture and demonstration will be utilized to introduce new concepts, techniques, and information. Students will spend the majority of class working on major projects. However, to promote a thorough knowledge of the concepts or techniques being introduced, students will also be expected to create preliminary sketches in their sketchbook, research and participate in class critiques, both written and oral. Students need to be focused, disciplined, able to work independently, and be ready to participate and give full effort daily.

Major Assignments and Projects: Emphasis is on the elements of art and principles of design. Students will have the opportunity to experiment with various materials and tools, and will be asked to be creative and original. All projects are graded with a set of criteria and in addition, will have standard requirements for craftsmanship, originality and control of media. Multiple entries in student sketchbooks throughout the semester will be incorporated.

- **Assignments:** Assignments will consist of approximately 20% of your grade. Prior to every project, we will learn about art processes and techniques. You will be required to complete assignments that help you learn these techniques. You will also complete research-based assignments in your sketchbook to help you plan themes and concepts for your projects.
- **Class Projects:** These will consist of approximately 80% of your grade. Projects will be completed in 2-3 weeks. You will have the majority of class periods to complete these projects, however if you do not finish in class, you will be responsible for completing projects outside of class prior to the due date.

Assessment Plan: Formative assessments will occur on a daily basis as a natural part of the critique method. Whole class, individual, peer and self-evaluations will be teacher facilitated as students become familiar and comfortable with this process.

Summative assessments will primarily be studio assignment-based with a performance assessment and outlined by specified scoring guide criterion which meets the specific learning objective for each unit. Each unit/objective will be clearly communicated to the student throughout the unit.

How can you be successful in this course?

- By listening and following directions
- By knowing and following behavioral expectations
- By producing creative, unique and imaginative work that shows personal style
- By putting forth his/her best effort and best craftsmanship
- By staying focused, completing work on time and including the completed evaluation sheet for each project
- By creating quality craftsmanship, which is vital in all art mediums.
- By understanding that mistakes are an essential part of the learning process and applying creative problem-solving skills.

Grading Policy:

- Student grades will be calculated using total points. 10% of total semester grade is the final.
- A lesson plan will be given to you at the beginning of each assignment. It will include a step-by-step description of the procedure. You will also be required to complete a grading evaluation at the end of every project before turning it in. This will include self-evaluation and teacher evaluation.
- Did you take your time? I would extend a class due date to allow you to do QUALITY work, rather than have you rush through and turn in less than your best work.

- Did you meet the DUE DATE? These dates will be announced and posted in the art room and in Google Classroom. If you need additional time, TALK TO ME prior to the due date and work on projects outside of class.
- Make sure you keep your sketchbook assignments up to date.
- Try your best! We will all make mistakes....many of them throughout the year. Take suggestions, make changes, and learn from the mistakes you make.
- STUDY for quizzes and finals. You will receive study guides and we will review them in class. Don't think "it's JUST Art class". You are responsible for learning the information, just as I am responsible for teaching it.

Rules & Responsibilities

- Always clean up after yourself and assist others with cleaning. If there's a mess anywhere, NO ONE will be dismissed.
- Respect your work and be respectful of others work and ideas. NO PUT DOWNS! If it's not a compliment or constructive, do not say it.
- Take responsibility for using your classroom work time wisely and turning in assignments on the due date!
- Immediately read the screen for directions when entering the classroom. Write down due dates and homework in your planner.
- Stay on task and do not disrupt others. Talking quietly at your table is a privilege, not a right. If the noise level is too loud, you will lose talking privileges and may need to receive a new seat.
- Treat materials and equipment with care. Avoid damaging materials and equipment. Leave the room the way you found it.
- Cell Phones are ONLY allowed for learning purposes. I will announce specific purposes in class. Personal/social use is NEVER acceptable in this classroom. This includes texting. Plan to place your phone in the class cubby.
